FAITH SHARING

Jesus draws our attention to practical points of Christian living and challenges us to use our words as he used his in his preaching and healing ministry — to heal, to restore, and to bring back life, joy, and hope.

The first reading teaches us that what is inside us is revealed through our conversation – as the grain and husks are separated in a farmer's sieve, as the quality of the shaped clay is revealed in the potter's fire, and as the size and quality of a tree's fruit reveal the care it has received from the planter.

<u>In the second reading</u> St. Paul advises the Corinthian Christians to be firm, steadfast and fully devoted to the work of the Lord, instead of wasting time on useless and sinful conversations, which bring punishment instead of the victory of resurrection and eternal reward.

In today's <u>Gospel</u> passage Jesus condemns our careless, malicious and rash judgments about the behavior, feelings, motives, or actions of others by using the funny examples of one blind man leading another blind man and one man with a log stuck in his eye, trying to remove a tiny speck from another's eye.

LIFE MESSAGE

We should avoid judging others because no one except God is good enough to judge others because only God sees the whole truth, and only He can read the human heart. Hence, only He has the ability, right, and authority to judge us. We do not see all the facts or circumstances or the power of the temptation which has led a person to do something evil.

Abraham Lincoln said that the only one who has the right to criticize is the one who has the heart to help. Therefore, we should leave all judgment to God, practice mercy and forgiveness, and pray for God's grace to get rid of all forms of evil in our lives. Let us remember the warning of saints: "When you point one finger of accusation at another, three of your fingers point at you."

THE RULES OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE FOR LENT

Everyone 14 years of age or older is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays in Lent including GOOD FRIDAY.

Everyone 18 years of age and under 60 years of age is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other



meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal one full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices, are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.



ASH WEDNESDAY – March 5, 2025

With Ash Wednesday we begin the holy season of Lent, our time for penance, reflection, and reconciliation. Please join us for **Holy Mass at 10:00 AM** or **7:00 PM**. Ashes to be distributed at both Masses.

Ash Wednesday is a holy day of obligation, and the distributing of the Ashes cannot be transferred neither to Sunday nor any other day.

LENTEN LAMENTATIONS – GORZKIE ŻALE

One of the signs of Lent in the Polish community are the Gorzkie Żale, called in English Lenten Lamentations or Bitter Lamentations, sung at church on Sundays during that somber season. They're a series of melancholic hymns about Jesus Christ's passion and death, meant to be a form of grieving for His



suffering. The Lenten Lamentations are divided into three parts. Part one recalls Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, arrest and unjust trial. Part two recalls Christ's suffering from his unjust trial to His being crowned

with thorns. <u>Part three</u> recalls Christ's crucifixion and death. Each part has its particular set of spoken intentions and hymns.

This year Lenten Lamentations will be held at Holy Family church in the Second (March 16), Third (March 23) and Fourth (March 30) Sunday of Lent at 3:00 PM. The Polish and English subtitles will be displayed on the screen.

JL 2:12-18

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Joel.
